

The Buffalo Tract Protection Act -Letters of Support

Governor Anthony Ortiz, The Pueblo of San Felipe

"The Pueblo of San Felipe has advocated and worked for many years to reclaim, preserve and protect the area known current day as the Buffalo Tract from mineral development and extractive mining. This area is an important part of our ancestral lands and contains cultural sites, including NAGPRA sites, and houses wildlife migration paths between the Sandia and Jemez Mountains. Protection of the Buffalo Tract will allow our youth and future generations to know our ancestral lands as we have and will ensure wildlife will remain undisturbed. The Pueblo of San Felipe is thankful for the work of Congresswoman Stansbury and the New Mexico Delegation who continue to work in partnership with Tribal Leaders to protect lands sacred to the first peoples of our State."

"The lands now known as the Buffalo Tract are part of the ancestral lands of the Pueblo of Santa Ana and form part of the link between our modern villages along the Rio Grande with our historic village of Paak'u. These lands, and the sites on these lands, are sacred to the Pueblo of Santa Ana. Currently, several mines are operating in this area – any new mining would only exacerbate the negative impacts that mining has on this area as well as further limit the movement of wildlife along this important corridor. Because of these impacts on our environment and wildlife corridors, Santa Ana has ceased mining activities on its lands and we support the effort to protect the Buffalo Tract from any new mining."

"The Merced de Comunidad De San Antonio De Las Huertas Land Grant (SADLHLG) supports Senate Bill 180 to withdraw certain Bureau of Land Management from mineral development. The community of the San Antonio de las Huertas Land Grant is deeply concerned about the amount of water that is being consumed by extensive mining in Placitas, NM, where our land grant is located. As mining has become more evident on the hills West of Placitas, so has the decreased amount of water in the aquafers. More than any time in the history of Placitas, water wells have gone dry in the community reflecting the decreased amount of water in the aquafers. Though mining isn't the only issue causing a decrease in the aquafers, it does directly affect the amount of water that is left in the aquafers. The (SADLHLG) has been stewards of the land and water in Placitas for over 250 years, and as a community we continue to strive to protect the resources our forefathers fought to preserve for future generations. The vision of protecting our resources for generations to come continues full force. It is our hope that as we protect the community from mining, it will preserve our water resources in the future and for that reason, we the Board of Trustees of the SADLHLG fully support Congresswoman Stansbury's effort by supporting S.
